Public Participation at UConn Health Board of Directors Meetings

The UConn Health Board of Directors starts its agenda with Public Comments. The Board of Directors shall hear brief oral presentations from members of the public who wish to express their views on issues pending before the Board of Directors or on other issues of concern to UConn Health. The agenda for each regular public meeting of the UConn Health Board of Directors shall allow up to thirty minutes for this purpose.

Requests to address the UConn Health Board of Directors shall be made to the Chair's designee at least one day prior to the meeting and may begin to be made the day following the last BOD meeting. The actual person who intends to speak must make the request.

The Chair of the UConn Health Board of Directors shall recognize each speaker in the order of signing up, shall request that the speaker state their name, and shall ensure adherence to time limits, to permit the orderly progress of the BOD through its agenda. Each speaker will be allotted a time period of three minutes to speak.

At a Special Meeting of the UConn Health Board of Directors, comments by members of the public shall be limited specifically to the subject described in the call of the special meeting.

The UConn Health Board of Directors would like to give each constituency an opportunity to speak, therefore, groups are encouraged to appoint a single spokesperson to present their point of view. The Board will not ask or answer questions, nor will Board members make comments during this portion of the agenda.

RE: Revised Tuition and Fees Proposal for UConn School of Medicine

RECOMMENDATION:

That the UConn Board of Directors approve the Revised Tuition and Fees Proposal for the UConn School of Medicine as follows, and as more fully described in the attachment:

- **Tuition Increases:**
 - CT Residents:
 - AY26-27: +2.0%
 - AY27-28: +3.6%
 - AY28-29: +3.7%
 - Non-Residents:
 - +2.25% annually for three years
 - Regional:
 - AY26-27: +2.31%
 - AY27-28: +3.6%
 - AY28-29: +3.7%
- **Professional School Fee:**
 - One-time (AY26-27) increase of \$470 in the Professional School Fee for all students (Resident, Non-Resident, and Regional).

BACKGROUND:

At its regular quarterly meeting on March 9, 2026, the UConn Health Board of Directors approved the School of Medicine tuition and fee increase proposals for the next three academic years.

The increases that the Board approved in March mirror the proposal being brought forward today, *with one exception*: In March, the Board approved increasing the AY26-27 resident tuition by 3.5% (a \$1,642 increase); this recommendation is being modified to *lower the increase for CT residents from 3.5% to 2% (a \$938.60 increase) for AY26-27*.

All other proposed increases remain consistent with what the Board approved in March.

At the March BOD meeting, and in the days and weeks following, Medical School students brought forward concerns about increased costs and borrowing limitations, and they requested that resident tuition remain the same for AY26-27. School of Medicine leadership looked into the concerns, and has worked to identify any potential savings for AY26-27 to provide relief on the tuition. In addition, we are encouraged by some positive developments on student financial aid.

Beyond borrowing using Federal loans, there is now a state legislated Supplemental Graduate Loan Program through the CT Higher Education Supplemental Loan Authority (CHESLA).

The Department of Education guidance has also now allowed more leeway for currently enrolled students during the remaining years 2-4 with up to \$224,000 borrowing, with maintaining Grad Plus eligibility, and with lifetime federal loan cap of \$257,500.

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WHY MEDICAL SCHOOLS INCREASE TUITION

Tuition increases are not about “making profit.”

Medical schools are expensive to operate, and several pressures can push costs up over time.

- Annual operating costs include:
 - Curriculum development/reform & delivery
 - Learning platforms, assessment tools, and electronic resources
 - Maintaining sim, other labs, standardized patient and clinical skills centers, equipment, technology, etc.
 - Clinical teaching retention and expansion
 - Support staff for the curriculum, accreditation requirements, student assessments, administration, etc.
 - Basic Science and Clinical Faculty and staff salaries
- Recent investments in teaching quality and student support
 - New simulation and anatomy technologies
 - Expanded wellness advising, mental health resources, Learning Center, tutoring
 - Accreditation costs of the SOM
- External pressures
 - Inflation has increased
 - Salaries and fringe costs increased
 - State funding has decreased
